

Fourth annual NFC event takes a ‘Church in a Diner’ approach

It's the championships, your child is a starter, and tip-off is at 10 a.m.

The catch? That game is on a Sunday.

If you attend the Sycamore Creek Church in Lansing, Mich., there is no need to worry about missing Sunday morning worship because “Church in a Diner” takes place on Monday nights at Jackie’s Diner, just five minutes from that United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Tom Arthur, chair of the New Church Development Team of the West Michigan Conference, is the mastermind behind the launch of “Church in a Diner,” a nationally recognized low-



cost and innovative approach to launching new faith communities. In just two years, the congregation of the Sycamore Creek Church has grown by more than 20 percent.

Rev. Arthur will be in Upper New York April 24-25 for the Conference’s fourth annual New Faith Community event at the Casowasco Camp & Retreat Center in Moravia. He will be the keynote speaker and will share the story of why and how he has created this vibrant new way of making disciples.

The event begins with registration at 5:30 p.m. Participants get to choose two from the following workshops:

- “Second Sites: How Your Church Can Extend its Reach with a New Faith Community” led by the Rev. Bill Vallet and members of his team at the Fresh Start Mall Campus in Horseheads, a new faith community of the Pennsylvania Avenue UMC in Pine City.
- “Starting a New Faith Community

in a Housing Development” led by the Rev. Rebecca Laird and members of the team at Cicero UMC’s second site: Bear Road New Faith Community.

- “Dinner Church: Making Disciples Around a Dining Room Table” led by some Upper New York church planters who have plans to start small group new faith communities around a weekly meal.
- “Bringing Jesus to the Yoga Mat: Starting a Yoga based New Faith Community” led by the Rev. Dee Lowman.
- “Team Building: Sustainable Planting thru a Team” led by the Rev. Dave Masland, Conference Director of New Faith Communities.

Friday night’s dinner worship will be led by Rev. Arthur, modeled by his “Church in a Diner” Ministry. The Rev.

Rachel Morse will lead worship on Saturday morning.

Bishop Deborah Kieseley of the Michigan Episcopal Area said she was very impressed with Rev. Arthur’s “innovative approach” to ministry.

“He finds ways to ‘go where the people are’ and has the ability to speak to those who might never feel comfortable coming through the doors of the traditional church building,” she said. “He is teaching us all how to be The Church, and how to make the message of Christ real for all.”

There are two rates for the event:
 Overnight participants – \$100 per person. This includes a one-night stay and three meals (Friday’s dinner, and Saturday’s breakfast and lunch).
 Commuter – \$30 per person. This includes Friday’s dinner and Saturday’s lunch.
